8. Education Partner Reports 8:50 pm		
Trustee - Absent		
Superintendent – Paul Block		
 Building announcements - \$17.5 million has been announced for 		
the expansion of Royal Bay. Current enrolment is at 1,000		
students for the 2017/18 school year, and projected enrolment for		
after the expansion will be 1,600 students. A PDR is in the works		
and the district is in the process of looking for bids from local		
contractors to complete the project.		
SD 62 is the fastest growing district in the Province, and		
continued development throughout both the Milne's Landing and		
Belmont areas of the district should continue that trend for the		
near future.		
Funding per district has been announced from the BCTF case		
award. In SD 62 that will include \$6.6 million to hire teachers to		
accommodate mandated class sizes and \$560,000 for overhead		
costs (which is new funding to support these changes with things		
like new support/facilities staff and upgrades to the existing fleet)

Student Learning Grants - \$.5 million dollars in funding	
includes 11% off the top to support services, and 16% to	
technology. Purchases will require district-wide resource group	
approval (administration, teachers, and PACs) for resource	
purchases made after July 1, 2017	
 School Safety - Colwood brought up concern with emergency 	
supplies in schools and how some schools have a great stock and	
others don't even have a supply of water for the students. It was	
asked if there was a provincial mandate regarding what schools	
need to have. Currently there is nothing in place, and no funding	
from the Ministry to cover those items. It was noted that this was	
one of the main concerns of the SPEAC Emergency Preparedness	
Committee and they are looking to establish a minimum baseline	
of supplies for all schools across the district.	
Seismic Upgrades - Happy Valley asked Paul Block if the new	
build schools and those with seismic upgrades were built to	
Withstand or Post-Disaster standards. Paul would find out as Tim	
had already left.	
Fundraising for Capital Assets - Many PACs have expressed	
concern over feeling pressured to fundraise for various Capital	
Assets (most often technology based). This was discussed and the	
consensus was that ultimately PAC funds are spent at the	
discretion of the PAC for the current year. Teacher and Principal	
wishlists or ideas are often welcomed, but final choices on what to	
fund/purchase is an individual decision.
