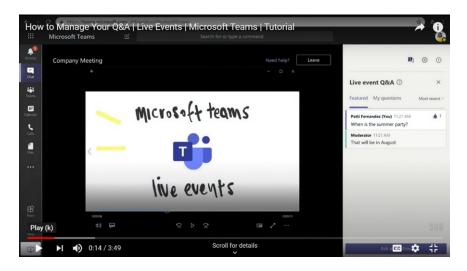

1. CALL TO ORDER AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF FIRST NATIONS TERRITORIES

The meeting was called to order at 6:01 pm by the Acting Committee Chair, Ravi Parmar acknowledging that we are honoured to be meeting on the traditional territories of the Coast Salish, specifically Esquimalt Nation, Songhees Nation and acknowledge the three nation SD 62 works with directly in our schools; Scia'new Nation, Coast Salish, and T'Sou-ke Nation; including the West Coast Pacheedaht Nation Nuu-chah-nulth. (words gifted by the three Nations SD62 works with)

2. COMMITTEE REPORT

The Board of Education of Sooke School District 62 (Sooke) received the Resources Committee Report dated May 10 2022 at its Public Board Meeting dated May 24, 2022.

4. BUSINESS

4.1 23/24 Major Capital Plan Submission – Harold Cull

Harold Cull provided an overview of the 23/24 Major Capital Plan Submission and the District's priorities for the next five years. The Committee discussed the use of portables in the District and the need to replace some of the older portables even though they will be needed for future growth. The Committee also discussed other mitigation strategies that may be required (split schedules at schools) due to the likely approval timelines of government. The proposed partnership with the Pacheedaht First Nation to create a K-12 campus in Port Renfrew to better meet the educational and recreational needs of the community was discussed. It was confirmed that the District's Minor Capital submission is due to the Ministry by September 30, 2022.

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: That the Board of Education of School District 62 (Sooke) approve the 23/24 Major Capital Plan submission as presented to the Resources Committee on June 14, 2022.

4.2 Business Continuity Plan (BCP) – Farzaan Nusserwanji

Farzaan Nusserwanji provided an update to the Resources Committee on the status of the Business Continuity Plan and supporting materials and the Committee provided feedback. The Committee asked staff a number of questions regarding the BCP and how it would be implemented. The Committee asked its partner groups to discuss the BCP with their executives and to bring any questions or concerns to the Resources Committee Meeting scheduled for September 13, 2022. The Committee also discussed the need to create a Board policy and regulation to ensure the BCP is maintained and updated on a regular basis. The Committee supported the following motion for the Board of Education's consideration.

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: That the Board of Education of School District 62 (Sooke) develop a Business Continuity Plan (BCP) Policy and Regulation in the fall of 2022 to ensure that the BCP is maintained and updated on an annual basis.

4.3 <u>Design Principles for Capital Projects – Harold Cull</u>

The Resources Committee reviewed the final version of the design principles prior to them going forward to the Board of Education for review and consideration. The Committee discussed the consultation process and the widespread input that was received throughout the process. The Committee would like to see "innovative" added to Principle 6 and that the finalized principles be provided to the students participating in the Student Forum to close the feedback loop.

The Committee supported the principles going forward for consideration to the Board of Education.

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: That the Board of Education of School District 62 (Sooke) approve the design guiding principles, reflective of the voices of our students, partners, Indigenous nations, and community for capital projects, as presented to the Resources Committee on June 14, 2022. Furthermore, that the principles be reviewed every 3 years.

4.4 District Facility Bookings – Harold Cull

After much internal discussion, the District has made the decision to not renew the agreement with Westshore Parks and Recreation (WSPR) regarding its management of facility bookings for our Belmont and Royal Bay families. WSPR has provided great service to the District for many years and the decision to bring this work in-house is another example of the District's maturation process.

Beginning in September 2022, SD 62 will make its own bookings through the Book King Facility Scheduling Software. There will be limited facilities that will continue to be booked by WSPR and the City of Langford and these facilities will be clearly indicated on the District's website. The Edward Milne Community School Society will continue to book facilities for the Milnes Landing family of schools.

Agenda Item: 4.1 23/24 Minor Capital Plan Submission

Background

- The District is required to submit a 5-year Capital Plan to the Ministry as approved by the Board
- The <u>Major</u> Capital Plan was submitted by June 30th and the deadline for the <u>Minor</u> Capital Program
 is September 30th
- Staff would like the input and support of the Resources Committee on the recommended Minor Capital projects, prior to making a recommendation to the Board

Capital Plan Components

• the District's Capital Plan submission is broken down into a number of programs:

Major Capital

- 1) Seismic Mitigation Program (SMP)
- 2) School Expansion Program (EXP)
- School Replacement Program (REP)
- 4) Rural Districts Program (RDP)
- 5) Building Envelope Program (BEP)

Minor Capital

- 6) School Enhancement Program (SEP)
- 7) Carbon Neutral Program (CNCP)
- 8) Bus Acquisition Program (BUS)
- 9) Playground Equipment Program (PEP)
- 10) Annual Facility Grant (AFG)

SEP – the School Enhancement Program is part of the minor capital program and is intended to improve the safety, facility condition, efficiency and functionality of existing buildings.

CNCP – the Carbon Neutral Capital Program is designed specifically for energy efficiency projects. The District's Energy Specialist will review the list of potential projects and provide a recommendation to the Committee/Board for consideration.

BUS – Bus Acquisition Program has allowed the District to acquire new buses and reduce the average age of the fleet. The Transportation Department will review mileage and age of our vehicles and will submit a list based on MoE's criteria.

PEP – the Playground Equipment Program is specific funding to purchase and install new or replacement playground equipment. Funding has been provided for playgrounds at Poirier (18/19) and Savory (19/20). No funding in this program was received in the current fiscal year.

Next Steps

• Now that the priorities have been drafted, staff would like feedback from the Committee on the proposed priorities prior to going to the Board for approval

Agenda Item: 4.2 Transportation Update

Background

- Staff will provide the Committee with a transportation update based the first few days of the school year
- The Board updated their transportation policy and regulation last spring
- Compared to previous years, the start up has been relatively smooth with the majority of issues focused on:
 - o Timing of the release of route information to late registrations;
 - o Incorrect timing of pick up and drop off due to new routes and construction;
 - o Challenges resulting from providing services for Lellum students to Dunsmuir/Spencer;
 - o Communication of changes to routes; and
 - Communication during routes when late/delayed.
- Staff continue to work through these and other issues as the transportation system (students, drivers and families) get into the regular rhythm of the school year
- Committee members will receive a deeper update at the meeting

Key Facts

- The District's transportation system is made up of:
 - ✓ 37 routes
 - ✓ 43 drivers
 - √ 6 electric buses

Agenda Item: 4.3 – Enrolment by School as at September 9

Please note these enrolment estimates are based on the first school counts of September 9th and are provided to give the Committee an initial assessment of the <u>direction</u> that enrolment is heading compared to budget. These estimates will be refined multiple times leading up to the District's submission to the Ministry in the first week of October.

Background

- The 22/23 budget is based on an estimated amount of K-12 Standard (Regular) School FTE of
 12,106 based on the attached Estimated Operating Grant table (12,000 as identified in February) plus an additional 106 FTEs added during the budget development process
- The following analysis and summary will also be based on the same FTE measurement of Standard (Regular) School FTE and does not include the other measures that make up the September count:
 - Continuing Education
 - Alternate Schools
 - Online Learning
 - Home Schooling
 - Course Challenges
- Initial numbers for our Level 1, 2 and 3 Special Needs FTEs will be provided with the understanding that these numbers will also change as assessments are completed prior to September 30th
- For budget purposes, the District estimated the following numbers:

Level 1: 12 Level 2: 620 Level 3: 365

Initial Enrolment FTEs from September 9, 2022

- Based on initial reporting from the schools (FTEs for elementary and middle with secondary reporting head count and a factor of 6.25% added to estimate FTEs), the District is estimating a total K-12 Standard (Regular) Schools FTE amount of 12,278
- The breakdown of this amount by school is reflected on the attached summary
- At the school level view, the following table reflects the amounts over the last three school years with the amount and percent increase from last year shown

Agenda Item 4.4: District Planning Framework

PURPOSE

• To provide the Resource Committee with an update to the District's planning framework with a specific emphasis on tying the multiple planning pieces together

BACKGROUND

- As we continue to grow, there is a need to refresh the approach to planning District work to ensure effective and efficient operations
- In any complex organization, there is cross-over and connection between work areas and having an established framework and timelines ensures smooth implementation as well as a shared vision

ANALYSIS

- The attached diagram illustrates the overall planning framework for the District tying in the several planning activities currently happening
- The Board's vision, mission, values and beliefs determine drives the strategic plan which runs for a set amount of years (3-4 years in SD62, up to 10 years in other districts)
- The Board also plans work, often done via committees who undertake the work of the Board dependent on topic
- The Board's Annual Work Plan which was devised and circulated at the start of the last school year overviews the weekly routine, the monthly meetings and the multi-year view over the course of the strategic plan

- Having these regular meetings means that items can be scheduled ahead of time and agendas better planned to avoid overcrowding and ensure items are correctly sequenced
- The strategic plan is implemented each year by way of the operational plan which is devised by the Superintendent in consultation with the Executive Team
- The operational plan makes up the Executive's Mandate Letters which are issued each September by the Superintendent and convey the expectations of work that the Executive will undertake
- In addition to the operational plan, some departments have their own departmental plans that feed up into the work of their Executive member's mandated work as outlined in the operational plan and the strategic plan
- Developing a new operational plan requires to be completed by November as the operational plans for the following year drive what is put forward for the next year's budget that gets developed between January and May
- Annual school plans are being developed which also align with the District's strategic plan
- The District undertakes initiatives with community partners and with our three larger municipalities through a memorandums of understanding (MOU) and this work also aligns with the strategic plan
- The staff of SD62 work each day towards the operational and strategic plan through their individual roles to which they bring skills and competencies
- In the 2021-22 school year, the SD62 Competencies for staff and for leadership were finalized and will feed into all job descriptions completing the link back to the strategic plan of the District

Next Steps

- The information contained in this note provides the basis for discussion by the committee to check whether this framework is useful and fulsome for planning district work ahead
- Committee feedback will be provided to the Board through the meeting minutes
